Eid -ul -Adha is also known as the Eid of Sacrifice. This Eid is celebrated in remembrance of the great sacrifice of Ibrahim when he intended to sacrifice his son Ishmael at the behest of Allah. Allah accepted their obedience and sent Ishmael a day for a sacrifice.

In memory of this incident, Muslims sacrifice animals every year. Cows, goats, camels or sheep are sacrificed and the meat is divided into three parts: one for the family, the other for relatives and friends, and the third for the poor and the poor.

Eid -ul -Adha's message is that everything can be sacrificed for the pleasure of Allah. This is a practical picture of the essence, generosity and unity.

The spiritual message of Eid
